

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ABOUT THE NOVEL

The War of the Worlds is a science fiction novel by English novelist, sociologist and historian H. G. Wells. It was serialised in a literary magazine between 1895 and 1897 and was published as a novel in 1898. It is one of the earliest stories that details a catastrophic conflict between humankind and extraterrestrial entities and is considered a landmark work of science fiction. It is told by an unnamed narrator who describes a Martian invasion of Southern England.

The novel was written at a time when there were widespread concerns about potential foreign attacks. It has been interpreted as a commentary on the theory of evolution,

imperialism and Victorian era fears, superstitions and prejudices. Wells later said that the catastrophic effect of European colonisation on the Aboriginal Tasmanians was an inspiration for the plot.

The War of the Worlds has been highly popular and influential. It has spawned countless movies, radio dramas, TV series, comic book adaptations and sequels or parallel stories by other authors. The novel even influenced the work of scientists. Robert H. Goddard was inspired by the book and helped develop the rocket technology which resulted in the Apollo 11 Moon landing 71 years later.

SUMMARY

One night, a cloud of flaming gas is observed on Mars, which is later discovered to be a missile sent to Earth. In the following nights, more of these are sent, making a total of ten.

The first of these crashes over Horsell Common near Surrey, England. It is believed to be a meteorite. Ogilvy, the well-known astronomer, is the first to go to the pit. The narrator lives in Maybury, close to the crash site, so he also goes. The thing inside the pit is a cylinder. When the top finally opens, a creature with a horrifying appearance emerges. A group of people called the Committee approach the pit waving a white flag, but the Martians kill them with the Heat-Ray. The narrator runs away in terror.

The next day the military forces arrive at the site and gunfire begins. In the evening, the narrator decides to take his wife to Leatherhead, where they will be safe. He borrows a horse cart from an innkeeper and takes her there. The same night, he drives back to Maybury to return the cart. On the way, he encounters two giant Martian fighting-machines—tripods—and crashes the cart. The horse is dead, and the narrator barely escapes. He walks back to his house and looks outside. He sees an artilleryman in his garden and invites him in. The next day, they leave the house, planning to go northward.

The two travel together for a while. At Weybridge, they see many boats carrying the people across the river. Suddenly, several tripods appear. They attack the people with their Heat-Rays. The narrator barely escapes by going under the water. Later he finds a boat and moves towards London. Exhausted and in pain, he lies down under the bushes. There he meets a curate.

The narrator stops telling his story to tell his brother's account of the events in London. Although people in London are quite calm at first, once firing is heard and news about the Black Smoke arrives, a great panic starts, and people begin fleeing the city. Meanwhile the narrator and the curate witness the attack of seven tripods that are armed with this chemical weapon, the Black Smoke.

The brother travels alone for a while and later meets two women, Mrs Elphinstone and her sister-in law. The three of them get on a steamboat, and as they leave the coast, Martian tripods appear. The warship the *Thunder Child* destroys two of them before being destroyed itself. The steamboat continues on its way.

The narrator returns to his own story. He and the curate are trapped in a house by the Black Smoke. When they are finally able to escape, they see a Martian fighting-machine which hunts people and collects them in a box on its back. The narrator and the curate go into a house and find some food. Suddenly, there is an enormous explosion, and the house collapses. Later they realise that a fifth cylinder has landed and that they are lying on the edge of the pit the Martians are making.

They are trapped beneath the ruins of the house for two weeks. They watch the Martians through a small hole in the wall and ration their food. As the days go by, the curate goes more insane, and their relationship deteriorates. The narrator has difficulty controlling the curate who acts hysterically. Eventually the curate is killed accidentally. Hearing the noise, a Martian stretches a tentacle into the ruins. It takes away the curate's body, and the narrator has a narrow escape.

The narrator keeps hiding in the ruins for a few more days. When the Martians finally leave the pit, he comes out and starts walking towards London. On the way, once again he encounters the artilleryman, who tells him that the Martians have destroyed London and it is the end of humankind. He tells the narrator about his plan to go underground and build a community of survivors there. The narrator seems persuaded at first but later decides not to join him. He leaves and resumes his journey.

He finds that London is a ruined city. He is hopeless and depressed. As he walks, he hears a Martian howling "Ulla, ulla". He follows the sound and sees a fighting-machine. He decides to end it all and walks towards the machine. To his surprise, the Martian inside it is dead. He discovers that all the Martians are dead—killed by disease bacteria.

The narrator suffers a nervous breakdown and is taken care of by a kind family. After he recovers, he returns to Maybury and discovers that his wife has survived. Later, he reflects on the Martian invasion and warns future generations to prepare themselves.
